GENEALOGY FAIR

Military uniforms and memorabilia from other wars that the United States has been active in will also be on display. People seem to have forgotten, and many of our young people have learned little about these conflicts. Every war has been fought to protect our freedom. We are not celebrating these wars. It is hoped that by seeing memorabilia of local residents who fought in various battles people will be able to understand that the wars touched everyone. from the Civil War through to the present. The men and women of Meigs County have played significant roles in protecting our country.

Information about the items or the person that wore or used the items help make displays more interesting. All items will be displayed in locked showcases plus the Courthouse has a security system. Ohio Chautauqua 2011: The Civil War

July 12-16, 2011 in Chester, Ohio.

Each year the Ohio Chautauqua Committees/Ohio Humanities Council chooses only five communities as hosts and this summer Chester is one of those communities.

The Chester Shade Historical Association is very proud to be a host organization for this great event the week of July 12-16, 2011.

What is Ohio Chautauqua? It is an event that transports people to a specific time and place in history. The Ohio Humanities Council sponsors and presents the Ohio Chautauqua each summer to give people that opportunity. This year the theme is the Civil War (1861-1865).

The Ohio Humanities Council and the Ohio Historical Society are encouraging communities to hold events to commemorate the Sesquicentennial of the Civil War (150 years since the Civil War began). This is by no means a celebration of the "Rebellion between the North and the South". The Ohio Historical Society wants to remind citizens of this terrible conflict so it will never be repeated.

The Civil War was the deadliest war in American history, taking more than 600,000 lives. Perhaps the greatest importance of the Civil War is how it impacted the country's future. It established Abraham Lincoln as one of the important figures in United States and world history, and launched the American military tradition. The war kept this young country together through its toughest time; by quashing notions of nullification and secession, the power of the national government was guaranteed. The service of nearly 200,000 black soldiers—the majority of whom were former slaves—established a claim for citizenship rights that the nation attempted to satisfy in the 13th, 14th and 15th Amendments to the U.S. Constitution. The Civil War redefined what America itself meant.

Each day during the week, two daytime workshops will be offered. One workshop will be for children and one for adults. These interactive programs and the discussions go beyond military struggle of the battles of the Civil War. **The presenters will not be in character for the workshops.**

DAYTIME WORKSHOPS

DEBRA CONNER (Mary Edwards Walker)

Adult Workshop: "Please, Do You Have Any News?"

The chaos of war left family members uncertain about the fate of their loved ones. In this workshop, we'll learn how Americans dealt with these staggering losses.

Youth Workshop: Healthy Living, Civil War Style

What foods did people eat to stay healthy 150 years ago?

JAMES ARMSTEAD (Martin Delany)

Adult Workshop: Strategy and Planning for the Long Campaign

This program examines Civil War strategy generally and the Anaconda Plan specifically as the recipe for victory.

Youth Workshop: The Every Day Life of the Civil War Soldier

In this show-and-tell session, Dr. Armstead will demonstrate some of the gear used by the "private" soldier and discuss his everyday living conditions while on campaign.

RICHARD JOHNSON (Abraham Lincoln)

Adult Workshop: Your Favorite Lincoln Stories and Mine

Bring your favorite Lincoln stories and let's swap stories for an hour. What stories do you recall from your childhood? What do you think is important for us to remember about Lincoln?

Youth workshop: Dear Mr. President

Dr. Johnson tells the delightful and inspiring story of Grace Bedell, the 11 year old girl who convinced Abraham Lincoln to grow a beard and encourages children to send a letter or a drawing to our current president. If a return address is provided, the letters will be sent to the White House and the child will receive a reply, a nice memento of our Chautauqua experience.

IILEEN EVANS (Harriett Tubman)

Adult Workshop: The Port Royal Experiment: Rehearsal for Radical Reconstruction of the South. This workshop explores different points of view during the Union Army occupation of Port Royal South Carolina from November 7, 1861 until the end of the war. Participants will be given the opportunity to engage and experience the story of some of the soldiers, missionaries, teachers, newly freed captives, nurses, cooks and spies through the eyes of Harriet Tubman.

Youth Workshop: African American Heritage: Stories, Games and Songs

This workshop will introduce some of the stories and games, music and songs, chants and rhymes that the folks may have heard when they arrived at Port Royal South Carolina in the 1860s.

DIANNE MORAN (Mary Boykin Chesnut)

Adult Workshop: A Literary Look at the American Civil War

Join award-winning storyteller Dianne Moran as she brings the past to life by sharing celebrated literary works of the American Civil War by authors such as Ambrose Bierce (born in Meigs County), William Faulkner, and Stephen Crane. Woven into the program will be interesting facts about daily life during the war.

Youth Workshop: Civil War Diaries

In this program, you will hear city residents as well as rural folks describe every day life through their wartime journals. At the conclusion of the program, Dianne Moran will share reproductions of Civil War items and two volunteers will be dressed in period clothing, helping us better understand daily life during that time.

EVENING PRESENTATIONS

The Ohio Humanities Scholars' presentations will give insight into the life and time of those who played an important part in our history and culture.

During the evenings five diverse characters will provide unique perspectives on the Civil War era:

- **Abraham Lincoln** who worked to preserve the Union and abolish slavery as he led the country during the Civil War.
- **Mary Edwards Walker** was the war's only female contract surgeon, a soldier who spent several months as a POW and an author. She was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.
- **Maj. Martin Delany** devoted his life to seeking full freedom and citizenship for African Americans.
- Confederate **Mary Boykin Chesnut** kept detailed diaries throughout the Civil War. She was a Southern aristocrat who was also an outspoken abolitionist.
- **Harriet Tubman** served as a nurse, cook, spy, and soldier who is remembered as "General Moses" who conducted the slaves through the Underground Railroad..

This event offers an intimate, friendly atmosphere that encourages audience participation. Following each presentation the audience is invited to ask questions about the historical character and to explore further more complex issues of the time, place, and the person.

The actors' portrayals of these historical individuals are very realistic. You won't want to miss this!

FUND RAISING TO BRING OHIO CHAUTAUQUA TO CHESTER

Chester Shade Historical Association needs to raise \$7500 to bring the Ohio Chautauqua to Chester. This fee helps pay for a tent that seats 500 people (chairs provided), five scholars who present the evening living histories, and the daytime workshops offered by the scholars for children and adults.

Yesteryear

The **Yesteryear Program** will begin at the end of March and continue through much of April. The Chester Shade Historical Association and the Retired Senior Volunteers Program co-op this program. CSHA pays for the children's materials and transportation. This allows all fifth graders in Meigs County to attend the workshops to learn skills such as leather tooling, candle making, tin punch, quilting, embroidery, basket making, primitive stitching, noodle and bread making. This gives children an opportunity to learn some history and to learn a skill. The students take their finished product home.

Some of the characters that we have portrayed in the past are Aunt Rhodie Knight, who led the the Union forces across Shade Creek when they were chasing John Morgan's men; Judge Osborn, an early judge in Meigs County; Lish Waters a local eccentric who lived in log; and Dorothea Steadman, wife of Levi Steadman who donated the land for the Chester Courthouse.

GENEALOGY NEWS

Volume V is finished!

It took almost 2 years but Volume V of *Old Meigs County Obituaries and Death Notices* is finished. This is our biggest volume yet. There are almost 4000 obituaries in this book. Due to increases in all of our costs and the fact that there are more pages in this book, we have increased the price to \$41 per book + \$4 S/H.

We still have a few copies of each of the first 4 volumes printed and they are available for \$37 + \$3 S/H. Each volume contains thousands of old obits from the Meigs County area. The oldest ones are from the 1850's and the latest ones are from around 1980. Most of them are from the late 1800's to the early 1900's. Since the obits were from old scrapbooks, personal collections, microfilm, old newspapers, and online transcriptions each book does not cover any specific time period. Each book contains complete indexes for not only the names of the deceased, but also most names that are mentioned in the obit and also separate indexes for cemeteries and ministers who officiated. In addition to the volumes of old obituaries we have many books of more recent obituaries. These are not for sale, but are available for research. Each volume is in a three ring binder and has been indexed. Some of these were donated but most of them were gathered, cut, sorted, pasted and indexed by volunteers.

Web Site

The indexes to two groups of our obit books are listed on our website (www.chestercourthouse.com). The indexes to volumes I-IV of *Old Meigs County Obits* and the *Bedford-Lodi Obits* are under the tab **GENEALOGY RESEARCH PAGE**. This is an easily searchable database. There are instructions on the page for how to obtain copies of the obits. We also plan to put the indexes to the other obits that we have in binders on the web site as soon as possible.

In the last year we have had dozens of books donated that have historical significance. Many of them deal with wars that the US has been involved in.

Also the **Catalog of Research Materials** will soon be available. This is a list of materials that are available to researchers for use in the Genealogy Room. One of our volunteers is working on updating this information now.
